NEW! Nominations for the 2020-2021 Haagen-Smit Clean Air Award

Considered the “Nobel Prize” in air quality achievement, Haagen-Smit Clean Air Awards are [given annually \(since 2001\) to individuals who have made significant contributions toward improving air quality](#) and climate change science, technology and policy, and the protection of public health. California’s premier air quality

award is named for the late [Dr. Arie Haagen-Smit](#), known as the “parent” of air pollution science and control.

The 2020-2021 program will award an individual in each of the following seven categories related to improving air quality:

1. Climate Change;
2. Community Service / Environmental Justice;
3. Education;
4. International Leadership;
5. Environmental Policy;
6. Research;
7. Science / Technology.

NTAA has published a [template letter for Tribes](#) to use to respond to EPA’s request for comment on EPA’s reconsideration of the previous administration’s Safer Affordable Fuel-Efficient (SAFE) Vehicles Rule. The EPA has broken this reconsideration into two parts:

1. SAFE-1, which includes interpretations that led to the withdrawal of the California waiver, and
2. SAFE-2, which will address the fuel efficiency standards (and is expected to be proposed in July 2021).

The deadline for commenting on SAFE-1 is July 6, 2021. The NTAA has developed a [Policy Resource Kit](#) that includes a [Fact Sheet](#) and [Tribal Template Letter](#) for Tribes to utilize when commenting.

EPA’s air quality training program is released three new training materials! These materials are foundational in level, and are being offered to tribal, state, and local air agencies in an e-learning format through our learning management system (LMS).

The materials include:

- A course that explains the purpose of the National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) within the air quality management process.
- A module that explains each of the six criteria pollutants under the Clean Air Act. This module represents “micro-learning”— a short, focused bit of training on a particular topic.
- A module that explains what air toxics are. Similar to the criteria pollutants module, this module represents “micro-learning.”

GAP Guidance Next Steps

The Indian Environmental General Assistance Program, or GAP, is the largest tribal capacity building program in EPA. Since its inception in 1992, GAP has been a primary source of non-competitive, consistent funding for tribes to address multi-media capacity building and solid and hazardous waste implementation needs. The efficient, effective, and flexible administration of GAP is a shared priority for tribes as well as EPA.

EPA is moving forward with finalizing revisions to the GAP Guidance. The EPA American Indian Environmental Office (AIEO) in the Office of International and Tribal Affairs (OITA) has scheduled two national webinars in June to share our progress and discuss next steps. The EPA is initiating consultation and coordination with federally recognized tribes regarding a memorandum to clarify the application of regulations under the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) to address organic air emissions from equipment and/or closure devices on certain hazardous waste units.

There are several ways to learn more about this topic in advance of deciding whether to request consultation. EPA will host an informational webinar for tribes

to explain the *Applicability of the RCRA Organic Air Emission Standards to Equipment and Closure Devices Memorandum* on June 30, 2021, from 2:00 – 3:00 PM (EDT). The Agency invites you and your designated representative(s) to attend the tribal webinar to learn more about the draft memorandum and have an opportunity to ask questions. EPA plans to accept public comments on the memorandum for 60 days beginning in July 2021. The specific dates for the submittal of public comments and the informational materials will be available on EPA’s Hazardous Waste Permitting [website](#). Tribes are encouraged to submit comments in writing during the public comment period by email at RCRApost@epa.gov. All written comments must be received no later than 60 days after the start of the public comment period. This consultation process for the memorandum will be conducted in accordance with the [EPA Policy on Consultation and Coordination](#) with Indian Tribes. However, EPA does not expect that the memorandum will have tribal implications, as specified in Executive Order 13175.

Office of Air and Radiation Update: Proposed Rule “Phasedown of Hydrofluorocarbons: Establishing the Allowance Allocation and Trading Program under the American Innovation and Manufacturing Act”

Hydrofluorocarbons (HFCs) are potent greenhouse gases commonly used in refrigerators, stationery and motor vehicle air conditioners, and many other applications. On April 30th, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) proposed the first regulation under the American Innovation and Manufacturing (AIM) Act of 2020, which requires the United States to phase down production and consumption of HFCs by 85% over the next 15 years by using an allowance allocation and trading program.

EPA is seeking public comment on this proposed rule, which would set the HFC production and consumption baseline levels from which reductions will be made, establish an initial methodology for allocating HFC allowances for 2022 and 2023, and create a robust and innovative compliance and enforcement system.

Companies that produce, import, export, destroy, or use HFCs in equipment may be interested in submitting data or commenting. More information on HFCs and the proposed rule can be found [here](#). The public comment period for the proposal will be open for 45 days after publication in the Federal Register.

Toxics/Mobile Sources

NTAA produced a [Policy Resource Kit](#) to help Tribes respond to EPA on its reconsideration of the 2019 action titled, the “Safer Affordable Fuel-Efficient Vehicles Rule,” for the purposes of rescinding the action taken by the prior administration. [NTAA commented on the full SAFE proposal](#), which included both the waiver withdrawal and the freezing of fuel efficiency standards, on October 26, 2018. This Reconsideration seeks comment on:

- Appropriateness of EPA’s interpretations that led to the withdrawal of CA’s CAA waiver to set GHG standards and a ZEV sales mandate

- Appropriateness of EPA's interpretation that disallowed other states to adopt CA GHG emission standards

EPA's Diesel Emissions Reduction Act's Tribal Grants for FY21

Request for Applications now open! More information can be found on this [flyer](#) and on [this website](#). EPA's 2021 Tribal and Insular Area grant program is now open. EPA anticipates awarding approximately \$5 million in DERA funding under this announcement. A total of \$4.5 million will be made available to tribal governments (or intertribal consortia) and Alaska Native villages, and \$500,000 will be made available to insular area governments. EPA anticipates awarding five to ten cooperative agreements to tribal governments (or intertribal consortia) and Alaska Native villages and two to four cooperative agreements to insular area governments. The U.S. EPA is in the process of conducting a residual risk and technology review of the 2002 National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants (NESHAP) for Major Source Primary Copper Smelting and a technology review of the 2007 Primary Copper Smelting Area Sources NESHAP.

After EPA publishes the rules in the *Federal Register*, EPA plans to accept comment on these proposals for at least 45 days after publication in the *Federal Register*. Interested parties can download additional information and a copy of the proposed rules (when they are officially issued by EPA) from [EPA's website](#) and this [website](#). Emergency Broadband Benefit Program Accepting Applications

The Federal Communications Commission just launched a temporary program to help families and households struggling to afford Internet service during the COVID-19 pandemic. Starting May 12, the Emergency Broadband Benefit (EBB) will provide a discount of up to \$50 per month toward broadband service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying tribal lands. Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers.

Eligible households can enroll through a participating broadband provider or directly with the Universal Service Administrative Company using an online or mail-in application. Assistant Secretary Sweeney Announces \$3 Million Living Languages Grant Program Funding Opportunity

Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs Tara Mac Lean Sweeney announced today that the Office of Indian Energy and Economic Development (IEED) is soliciting applications to the Living Languages Grant Program (LLGP). This \$3 Million grant program will fund between 15 and 60 grants, ranging from \$25,000-\$200,000, to federally recognized American Indian tribes and Alaska Native entities to document, preserve and revitalize Native languages and build active speaker capacity. IEED's solicitation for LLGP funding and details on how to apply can be found in the [Federal Register](#) and at Grants.Gov.

EPA is now accepting applications for a total of \$9 million in grants to fund about 24 Great Lakes Restoration Initiative projects to address stormwater runoff pollution from land into water bodies. EPA is also holding an applicant webinar.
